Songs in a Cave


I Samuel 22:1-2, Psalms 142 & 57

- I. David Escapes to a Cave, I Sam. 22:1-2

Psalm 57—a Psalm of Lament

Lament Motif:

- 1) confront the crisis
- 2) conquer the crisis by:
 - a) naming it
- b) praying to God to act
- c) expressing trust in God

Shape/structure of lament psalms:

- a) Opening Cry to God, request for help, 1-2
 - b) Declaration of confidence in God, 3
 - c) Description of the crisis, 4
 - d) Petition, 5
 - e) Description of the crisis, 6
 - f) Vow to praise God, 7-10
 - g) Petition, 11
