












Why?

Deuteronomy 3:21-22

²¹ At that time I commanded Joshua: "You have seen with your own eyes all that the Lord your God has done to these two kings. The Lord will do the same to all the kingdoms over there where you are going. ²² Do not be afraid of them; the Lord your God himself will fight for you."

So what?

The Lord still fights for his people...

1. We must remember the **Context** of the promise in Deuteronomy.

2. We must remember how to treat general versus specific promises given in the Bible.

So what continued...

"Through Moses, the LORD repeatedly exhorts His people not to fear their enemies but instead to trust that He is fighting in their behalf."

- New covenant believes do not wrestle against human beings in the same manner that the Israelites battled again to the Canaanite (Ephesians 6:12).
- Nor do we fight spiritual battles with physical weapons (Ephesians 6:11).
- But new covenant believers still have enemies.
 - The devil
 - The world
 - The flesh

As new covenant believers we know the good news.... God has won the ultimate victory over our enemies
